
# 6. You have traveled to many interesting cities. Where is the best place you have been?

O: I've been to Sydney, Brisbane, Auckland, Christchurch, New York City, Chicago, Los Angeles, London, Liverpool, Munich, Cologne, Brussels, Amsterdam, Istanbul, Hong Kong, Singapore, and so on. But Osaka is one of the most interesting cities.

#### 7. You have met many famous people. Who was the most interesting?

O: I've met Osamu Tezuka (1928-1989, born in Osaka) in Takadanobaba and I've got his **autograph**. He gave me a quick sketch of Blackjack's portrait on a page of my lecture notes! He is a **genius** and one of my favorite people. My other favorite people are John Lennon (1940-1980) of the **legendary** rock group 'The Beatles' and Sadaharu Oh (1940-), the famous Japanese baseball player for the Yomiuri Giants and now Fukuoka Softbank Hawks Chairman of the Board. Though, I haven't met them! John Lennon was **shot** to death at 40 in 1980. At the time I was about to **graduate** university. I was so sad and everybody in the world **mourned** the **loss** of great music. Sadaharu Oh was born in the same year as John Lennon but he had a great talent **hitting** homeruns... 868 **homeruns**! This is No. 1 in the world, more than Barry Bonds (762), Hank Aaron (755), or Babe Ruth (714) in **Major League Baseball (MLB)** in the U.S.A. Though some people **complain** about the different sizes of the baseball fields.

You went to Waseda University and helped with the Japan Study Program in 1978. That was Sheila's study abroad program in 2015-2016! Please tell us about that.

O: In the middle of the 1970's, when I was a Waseda University student, I was not only a member of baseball club **organization** (*Yakyu Dokokai*) but also a member of Waseda Manga Club (Manken). And what's more, we **founded** a **film-making** organization. It was named *Ronin-gai*, after a famous movie in 1957. It looks like it still **exists** now, because I have seen the name on the **web** recently.

And one more, I was a helper for the exchange students from the Great Lakes Colleges Association (GLCA) and American Colleges of the Midwest (ACM) in the U.S.A. This is the group that Sheila was also a member of over 40 years later at Waseda University. What a **coincidence**!

I guided the foreign exchange students in how to take a public bath at the nearest Matsunoyu, and how to use Japanese style toilets. I also guided them so they could use facilities in the orientation place. And I assisted professors to teach classes, then attended teachers' meetings to make comments for better Japanese classes. And Professor Yoji Tanabe asked me to translate the Waseda college song into English for the students to understand the meaning. We always sang it at the end of the party.

**Miss Sheila's comment:** 'I am from Maryland, near Washington D.C. but I went to Kalamazoo College. The school is in Michigan so it's in the GLCA/ ACM! I was so happy and **grateful** to do the Japan Study Program. The Japanese students who helped us were part of a 'circle' called *Niji-no-Kai*. They guided us and became our friends. We went on autumn and spring **retreats** too, just like Mr. Ohzono did in his time! Amazing! Did you know that Mr. Morikawa, Mr. Hiratsuka, and Mr. Natsugari went to Waseda too?'

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You studied animation and helped manga authors. Please tell us about that.

O: This time for the Keika Chronicle, I will tell you the story behind W.U. Manga Club, Manken...

One day I happened to enter the club room at student hall (gakusei kaikan). I was asked to help a senior member (senpai) draw and make a manga version of the famous TV drama Kinpachi Sensei (Pictures 1,2). So, I went to his house in Nerima City to draw frame lines, draw background effects, make the blank part black, and so on. As is usual with manga artists, they are very busy when the deadline of the work is near. So, he was very nervous about it, and we had almost no breaks. We only drank lots of coffee and smoked... just drawing, drawing, and drawing... day after day. Now I don't remember which part of which volume of the complete set it was.

At the same time, my friend was also a member of the club. She was one of the young ones who tried to become a comic artist (mangaka) like Machiko Satonaka, Moto Hagio, or Riyoko Ikeda. One day, I heard that a big magazine company (Shueisha Inc.) agreed to debut her original story. So, she made a romance story and put in a main character who was modeled after me! Of course, I assisted her work, drawing frame lines or background effects. (Pictures 3a, 3b, 3c, 3d) She continued to make her stories in a famous monthly magazine for girls. (Picture 4) And then she got married after making plenty of works. (Picture 5) But she found that she couldn't have a baby, so she got infertility treatment. In the end, she overcame it and had a baby. She made the whole story into a book! It sold popularly at that time. (Picture 6) And she wrote a couple of books about raising her child. (Picture 7) She also translated "Alice in Wonderland" into modern Japanese. (Picture 8).

So now you know that Manken was a **jewel box** for **talent**, making many great members. In the 1980's after I graduated, some other of my **seniors** (senpai) made famous video game software... the **Dragon Quest** series!

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
