

Job Hunting Differences!

When to apply- Japan

Job hunting season in Japan is around February to April. This matches the Japanese school system- where school and University students graduate in March. The goal is to graduate in March, and start your new job in April. Students work hard in their last **semester** of university. They must search for jobs while also going to their classes.

When to apply- Australia

There isn't a **specific** job hunting season in Australia. Many universities have 3 terms a year, so students can start in March, July, or November. That means our graduation ceremonies are also in those months. However, some degrees are longer than others, and some people do special courses to finish quicker. So there are new people joining the **workforce** all throughout the year. Also, people can start new careers at any age. Even though many **new hires** are University graduates, older hires are quite common as well.

How to apply- Japan

You might start your job hunting by going to a job fair for companies in your field of study. Next, it's a good idea to do your own **research** into companies that were interesting. When it's time to apply, there are many steps! Submitting your entry paper and **resume**, doing **aptitude** tests, **personality** tests, or written tests, going to **multiple** interviews, and filling out **paperwork**.



How to apply-Australia



We have job fairs in Australia, but applying for jobs online is more common. If you're interested in a company but they are not hiring at the moment, you can still introduce yourself to them. You can give them a resume so they will remember you when they are looking for new people. Making **connections** like this is very important for job hunting. We say that 'It's not what you know, but who you know.'

What to wear- Japan

It is very easy to spot a Japanese job hunter! They all wear a black suit, with a white shirt underneath. If they carry a bag, it should be a black **briefcase**. Men should wear a plain tie, usually black. Women should wear skin-coloured stockings, plain make-up, and low heels. The most important thing is to look **professional**, and not **stand out**.



What to wear-Australia



We wear different clothes for different jobs. If you are applying for a **manager** level job, or an important job like a **lawyer**, you should wear a suit. But for many jobs, **business casual** is also a great choice. Business casual colours are usually black, white, grey, beige, and navy blue. But it can be nice to wear this with one fun colour to help you stand out.

My job hunting experience

I started University in March 2015, and graduated in November 2017. Instead of looking for a job, I stayed at university to do a **master's degree**. I learned to teach high school English & Japanese. I started in March 2018 & graduated in July 2019. My course finished a little early, so I got my teaching **license** early too. I actually worked as a teacher a few times before my graduation ceremony!

I started looking for jobs around June 2019. I chose 3 schools that taught Japanese and gave them my resume. They weren't hiring new teachers yet, so I said I was happy to start as a **substitute** teacher. This is when you are hired to work just one day to fill in for a teacher who takes the day off.

Over the next few months, 2 of these schools called me, and I came in every now and then when a teacher was sick. There were also 2 other schools that called me to substitute teach, and I usually went to them at least once a week. One of the schools knew me because they found my name on a teacher **database** for my area. The other remembered me from university. I did some of my **teaching practice** there!

Next, I did **long-term** substitute teaching at 3 different schools. This is when a teacher is going to be away for a long time, and someone is hired to teach their classes for a few weeks. One of the jobs was at a **primary school**, which was new for me! They were the only Australian school who wanted to do a **job interview**. I wore a black skirt & a grey blouse. It was a **relaxed** interview with the principal and the teacher I was replacing. It was about 30 minutes, & they called me a few hours later to say I got the job.

In 2020, I worked as a proper **full-time** teacher for the first time. Australian schools are split into 4 terms. I worked for one school for all of **term** 1. It was actually my high school from when I was a student! When my time there ended, my boss recommended me to the head of English at a different school. I worked there for term 2, 3, and most of 4.

My next job was here at Keika! I applied to the JET Programme, which sends people from all over the world to teach English in Japan. I sent in an **application** that had lots of paperwork, an **essay**, and references from other teachers. My job interview was at the Japanese **consulate** in my area. It was very serious! I wore a white shirt, a black suit jacket, and a grey check skirt. I got my interview **results** about 2 months later. Before coming to Japan I did a **health check**, and even more paperwork. There were some delays because of covid, but I finally came to Japan in November 2020. I had to say goodbye to my students back home a little before the end of the school year so that I could come here. Now I'm having fun every day here at Keika Girl's! I hope you all enjoy my classes too.
